
Announcing: Argyle House

The Camp Nor'wester staff experience has officially changed forever! We are excited to announce that this winter, Camp Nor'wester made the significant move to purchase a property on San Juan Island to accommodate staff on their time off. Recent staff members

will know that this is a momentous occasion!

It has been a long process with a dedicated Task Force of Board members to reach this point. In 2019, the San Juan Property Task Force was charged with defining the needs for Camp to acquire a property for staff to use on their Time Off days. After exploring a wide range of options, Task Force members came across Argyle House in the fall. What then followed was a diligent vetting process, which included conversations with the town of Friday Harbor and realtors, a feasibility study on the potential investment, and many discussions with the Nor'wester Board of Directors and Year-Round Team.

Affectionately referred to as "Argyle House," this new property is ideally located in Friday Harbor. The house has five bedrooms, five bathrooms, two accessory dwelling units, and a beautiful yard. The Year-Round





We are THRILLED that Nor'wester now has a safe and comfortable space where staff can choose to stay overnight on their Time Off days during the summer and are grateful for everyone who helped make this happen! Stay tuned as the Task Force continues to look at year-round use possibilities for this incredible investment.

House Manager Volunteer Opportunities!

Are YOU interested in being on San Juan Island this summer for a week or more?

In order to support staff use of Argyle House this summer, we are looking to arrange for "House Managers" to be on-site for at least a week at a time across the summer season. The vision is similar to a "campground host" concept – we're looking for reliable alumni or friends of Camp to sign-on to ensure staff lodging goes smoothly, and to maintain house standards and expectations, in exchange for a free place to stay (one bedroom, private bathroom) in Friday Harbor.

Calling all you work-from-homers; the house has great wifi!!!

Specific dates we're looking to cover are: June 27-July 20 & July 28-Aug 20. Camp Leadership will provide an orientation to the job and specific information and resources to ensure you are prepared for everything. Program Corner

"San Juan Spirit means Service to Others" or SJS means STO - This motto has been shared amongst campers and staff for generations of Nor'wester history. Circulated first at the Henderson Camps in the 30s and 40s, it's been carried on by many eras of Nor'wester folks, including one of the greatest Camp fans, Donn Charnley (please see Page 5).

In our program, we continue to provide opportunities for campers to practice stewardship and learn about the Camp's environmental impact on our main property on Johns Island. Units are expected to contribute to at least one camp improvement project each week of their session, and many grounds and facilities improvements over the years have been successful because of the contributions of campers.

Additionally, over the decades, campers have participated in various service projects throughout the San Juan islands. In the 2000s, Paul & Christa started an organized relationship between Camp and Lopez Community Land Trust, sending campers on overnight trips to participate in various projects to support affordable housing development on Lopez. That tradition has blossomed into a strong partnership with LCLT, and we continue to arrange overnight trips to work on service projects there.

In 2019, we ran our first "Service Trip" as part of our Big Trip outcamp program. Campers helped with a day of projects with San Juan Preservation Trust on Shaw Island, and another day of projects at Stonecrest Farm on Lopez. In 2022, a Big Trip (five days in length) headed to Waldron, where campers helped SJPT with trail and conservation projects and gained environmental education specific to the SJI region from SJPT staff.

While these trips help us expand our trip choices for campers, a key goal in planning for 2019 was to include additional trip options where the itinerary wasn't as reliant on the physical ability of participants to be carried out. Additionally, we're finding that many campers are glad to have service opportunities during the summer as we are able to work with school programs to confirm volunteer hours, which for some is required for graduation.

We are excited to continue Service Trips again this summer. We have a Little Big Trip (four days in length) planned First Session at Turtlehead Preserve on Orcas island with SJPT, and are finalizing plans for a Second Session opportunity with a new partner organization. And we will continue our overnight trips to Lopez to work with LCLT for sure. Helping campers learn principles of stewardship is a named goal of Nor'wester, and is tied to our mission statement ("... to learn about themselves, their community, and their environment."), so we are proud to include these opportunities in our program every summer.

Great things are ahead for Nor'wester, and I'm feeling lucky to be a part of it!

Honoring Donn Charnley

Donn Charnley often exuded a distinct joie de vivre, an exultation of spirit, while at his beloved Camp Nor'wester. His involvement in and contributions to camp, including many years on its board, spanned 86 years, until his death in Seattle at 94 on Feb. 5, 2023. Plans for a memorial gathering are pending.

He delighted in many things: singing with a guitar looped over his shoulder; tromping in the field with a group of geology students or campers; leading the stroke with a canoe paddle in hand; building and sitting around a communal fire; sleeping in a tipi; backpacking; skiing; swinging a hammer and wielding an ever-present geologist's magnifying loupe.




Worried about a polio outbreak, his mother sent him to Henderson International Camps for Boys in 1937 when he was 9. He fell in love with it and returned annually as a camper, then started working there. Through the decades, he was a counselor, led Big Trip trail hikes and bike outings, taught canoeing and worked on special projects.

This relationship gave him lifelong direction, purpose and friends among the campers and staff and honed his zeal for the outdoors.

He enjoyed inspiring young people to develop a love for community and the outdoors and embrace the motto San Juan Spirit means Service To Others (SJS means STO), which was posted in a common area at Henderson's.

Until struck by fragile, old age and the COVID quarantine in 2020, he often devoted weeks every summer to doing projects at Camp Nor'wester.



The joy he gained from exploring the world, sharing his geological knowledge and all things outdoors thoroughly rubbed off on his kids, who embrace those pursuits, a concern for the environment and singing many of his favorite folk songs.

He found great joy in geology, a science that combined many of his interests in the natural world. He excelled as a geology professor who

taught thousands of students over 58 years, 32 years at Shoreline Community College and the remainder in extension courses to retirees until fall 2022.





He also served fellow citizens while on many boards and as a representative and senator in the Washington State Legislature.

He was born April 3, 1928, in Detroit, grew up in Tacoma and Seattle and earned degrees from the universities of Washington and Minnesota

Survivors include his children, companion Corinne Waters, eight grand-children, several great-grandchildren, and a legion of friends and colleagues. He was preceded in death by wife Melinda Denton and lifelong best friend Bill Holm.

Service to others describes his life's work and mission, which would be perfect for a headstone. His family will mingle his ashes with those of Melinda's at the family's Otter Cove property on Lopez Island.

Campaign Goal: \$775,000




Construction has started on the Henderson Commons, and we have kicked off our public campaign with a Town Hall Event discussing the project and fundraising efforts on March 21st.

Dearest Nor'wester Community,







Note from the Director: Spring (board) into a Life-Shaping

A "community lifecoach" experience, all wrapped up into a 4-week adventure, shepherded by caring and nurturing staff.

So, how can we help the young people in our lives to manifest the most compelling and life-shaping experience this summer? We can help them:

- Envision the very best scenarios and outcomes, personalized to their hopes and dreams
- Prepare them for the social awkwardness and excitement of making new friends

- Be OK with being uncomfortable
- Talk about what it means to self-advocate and have a voic
- Learn how to acknowledge when they are wrong or make a mistake



History Corner: Camp Directors

Now that Sheila Tallmon has announced her decision transition out of the Executive Director position, and the Board of Directors has begun the process of searching for a new Executive Director, it seems appropriate to take a look back at Camp's previous Directors.

Nor'wester has been very lucky to have had excellent directors throughout its history. Each brought their own skills and outlook to the job, and each left their imprint on the camp. As the camping industry has matured, and as societal needs and expectations have changed, it seems that the camp has always had the right Directors at the right time.



Low turnover among the Directors has also benefited the camp. Since it was founded in 1935, there have been just five leadership teams, with an average tenure of more than 17 years. This has provided stability and continuity to the camp, and is one of the reasons that Nor'wester is



ranked among the top camps in the country.

When Frank Henderson founded the camp in 1935, he drew on his years of work with the Boy Scouts to create a summer camp based on the same princi-

pals of fellowship and camaraderie that he had observed at International Scout Jamborees. Frank married Lucile Townsend in 1938, and her long experience with the Girl Scouts, on both the local and national level, provided the impetus to open the camp to girls in 1942. Lucile also brought a hard-nosed business sense to


compliment Frank's vision for

the camp.

The Hendersons retired in 1966 after 32 successful seasons. They sold the land to a group of investors who then hired Jack and Jan Helsell to reopen and

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run the camp. Jack had spent his summers as a child at Four Winds, and he and Jan had briefly directed that camp. The Helsells brought a new sense of adventure and freedom to Nor'wester to fit the times. They instituted the Mt. Baker Big Trip and added their beautiful 48-foot sloop, Courageous, to the program. They have also very generously allowed Nor'wester to camp on their property on Orcas Island for more than fifty years.

The camp was sold again in 1980, and the new owner hired David and Susan Formo as directors. As a child, Susan had been a camper at east coast camps, but David had no prior experience with summer camps. Despite this, they jumped right in and added their own touches to the camp. Their tenure brought a renewed focus on safety, and they worked to create a more equitable division of responsibilities among the staff. They also introduced the ever-popular staff jackets.



Paul Henriksen and Christa Campbell took over the reins in 1990. Paul had been caretaker at the camp for many years, and Christa had worked as the camp's dietitian. Early on, they were successful in increasing Camp's enrollment, which had been flagging. Their biggest challenge, however, came in 1996, when the

camp and property were sold. Suddenly Nor'wester was without a home and without any assets. Rather than give up, they dug in their heels and helped the camp reform itself into a non-profit organization, and then began searching for a new home and raising money to pay for it. After a three year search, the camp settled on its current location on Johns Island. Paul's ability to manage the challenging task of building out the new camp site made him the ideal person for the job. Paul and Christa directed the camp for 22 summers.

Sheila Tallmon was hired as Executive Director in 2012, worked at many camps prior to this in Nebraska and Colorado, including Cheley Colorado Camps for 13 years. Sheila has made the well-being of both campers and staff a top priority, and has worked hard to create a welcoming environment for eve-

ryone. Her long experience in the camping world has helped

Nor'wester forge new ties with organizations seeking to improve the camping industry. Sheila was the first Nor'wester director to not co-direct with a spouse, but she hired Jill Steigerwald as Assistant Director and that pairing has been very successful.

Despite all of the changes to camp over the years, Frank Henderson's vision of creating an outdoor living experience where campers can learn and grow has remained constant. His original motto for the camp still rings true: "In quest of things worthwhile for youth."
